


WHAT BOOK CLUB IS ABOUT....






BOOK DISCUSSION FOR 2017



The Boys in the Boat by Daniel James Brown (January 27, 2017)
Out of the depths of the Great Depression comes the astonishing tale of nine working-class boys from the American West who at the 1936 Olympics showed the world what true grit really meant.




The 100-Year-Old Man Who Climbed Out the Window and Disappeared by Jonas Jonasson (February 24, 2017)
Confined to a nursing home and about to turn 100, Allan Karlsson, who has a larger-than-life back story as an explosives expert, climbs out of the window in his slippers and embarks on an unforgettable adventure involving thugs, a murderous elephant and a very friendly hot dog stand operator.



Going Clear: Scientology, Hollywood, and the Prison of Belief by Lawrence Wright (March 24, 2017)
A clear-sighted revelation, a deep penetration into the world of Scientology.



Ordinary Grace by William Kent Krueger (April 28th, 2017)
New Bremen, Minnesota, 1961. Not a great year for thirteen-year-old Frank Drum, it was a grim summer in which death visited often and took many forms.




Killing Lincoln by Bill O'Reilly and Martin Dugard (May 226th, 2017)

A powerful, engrossing novel about a remarkable family over three transformative decades in America.




March: Book One by John Lewis and Andrew Aydin (July 28th, 2017)
This graphic novel is a first-hand account of Congressman John Lewis' lifelong struggle for civil and human rights.



The Sandcastle Girls by Chris Bohjalian (August 25th, 2017)
This spellbinding tale travels between Aleppo, Syria, in 1915 and Bronxville, New York, in 2012—a sweeping historical love story .



The Aviator's Wife by Melanie Benjamin (September 22, 2017)
Despite her own major achievements—she becomes the first licensed female glider pilot in the United States—Anne Morrow Lindbergh is viewed merely as Charles Lindbergh's wife.



The Garden of Letters by Alyson Richman (October 20th, 2017)
Portofino, Italy, 1943. A young woman steps off a boat in a scenic coastal village. Although she knows how to disappear in a crowd, Elodie is too terrified to slip by the German officers while carrying her poorly forged identity papers. She is frozen until a man she's never met before claims to know her.



Saving CeeCee Honeycutt by Beth Hoffman (November 17th, 2017)
For years, 12-year-old CeeCee Honeycutt has been the caretaker of her psychotic mother. But when her mother is killed, CeeCee is left to fend for herself. To the rescue comes her great-aunt from Savannah, Tootie Caldwell, who whirls CeeCee into her world of female friendship, strong women, wacky humor, and good old-fashioned heart.



White Doves at Morning by James Lee Burke (December 8th, 2017)
Epic story of love, hate and survival set against the tumultuous background of the Civil War and Reconstruction. At the center of the tale are Robert Perry and Willy Burke. Despite personal and political conflicts, both men join the Confederate Army, determined not to back down in their commitment to their moral beliefs and to the abolitionist woman with whom both are infatuated.
