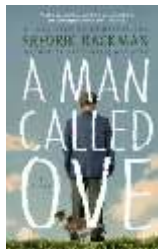

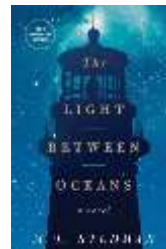
A Man Called Ove

Meet Ove. He's a curmudgeon—the kind of man with a short fuse. Behind the cranky exterior is a story and a sadness. When the next door neighbors accidentally flatten Ove's mailbox, it is the lead-in to a comical and heartwarming tale. All of which will change one cranky old man.

After WW I, Tom and his wife start a new job as the lighthouse keeper on Janus Rock, an isolated island with no residents. After multiple miscarriages and a stillbirth a boat with a dead man and a baby washes ashore, they decide to keep the baby as their own, but the consequences may be dire.



Hillbilly Elegy

by J.D. Vance (September 28th)
Story of the author's family and upbringing, describing how they moved from poverty to an upwardly mobile clan that included the author, a Yale Law School graduate, while navigating the demands of middle class life and the collective demons of the past.



All the Stars in the Heavens

by Adriana Trigiani (February 23rd)
The movie business is booming in 1935 when Loretta Young meets and falls in love with Clark Gable on set. Far from Hollywood, Sister Alda Ducci has been forced to leave her convent which leads her to Loretta. Over the course of decades, she & Loretta forge an enduring bond of love that will be put to the test.

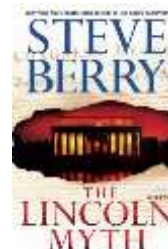
Stealing Mona Lisa

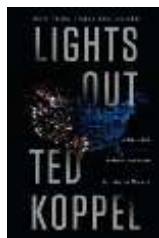
The Lincoln Myth

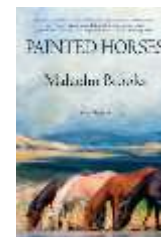
After the Crash
